# **Meet Your NRRIG Leadership!**

#### **Chair: Yetkin Borlu**



I am a visiting assistant professor of sociology at the University of Richmond. I received my Ph.D. in Rural Sociology at Penn State. My current research engages contemporary debates in international and domestic rural development and policy, with a focus on how global economic restructuring in agriculture affects the environment and farmers' livelihoods. My publications in <u>Rural Sociology</u> and <u>Current</u> <u>Perspective in Social Theory</u> examine the relationships among financialization, state regulation, and industrial agriculture. I also have published papers in <u>Rural Sociology</u> and <u>Society and Natural Resources</u>

about community impacts of fracking in Pennsylvania. My current work studies the relationship between resource scarcity and farmers' perception of environmental problems in the U.S. I am also leading a project on the impacts of financialization on commodity systems in Turkey, which was supported by the RSS Early Career Award in 2016. I am looking forward to working with Amanda and Cat as the NR-Team.

#### **Co-Chair: Amanda Buday**



I am an assistant professor of sociology at Fort Hays State University, (it's in Kansas!). My research examines community responses to energy development, with an emphasis on strategies community leaders are using to assert greater local control over development. My work on mobilization processes in grassroots anti-fracking activist groups appears in *Social Currents* and *Sociological Perspectives*. In current work, supported by an RSS Early Career Award, I am examining dynamics of resource mobilization facilitated by mineral and royalty owner associations in the Great Plains region. The goal of this project is to use

the lessons rural residents have learned over decades of interactions with oil and gas companies to inform planning and policies related to wind energy development. I look forward to this opportunity to help coordinate NRRIG communications and activities.

# Graduate Student Representative: Cat Edgeley



I am a Ph.D. candidate at the University of Idaho, based in the Department of Natural Resources and Society. My research focuses on community diversity and wildfire, looking specifically at how different populations across the West approach evacuation and recovery after fire events. Through this, I am working closely with several rural communities to explore how wildfire management and policy can be tailored to better address local needs. I am originally from the UK, where I studied for a BSc in Geography and an MSc in Risk and Environmental Hazards at Durham University. It was great to be

# NRRIG Graduate Student Paper Award

For her timely and compelling paper, "We Made the Choice to Stick it Out: Negotiating a Stable Home in the Rural, American Rust Belt," **Amanda McMillan Lequieu**, PhD Candidate in Sociology at University of Wisconsin- Madison, received the NRRG Graduate Student Paper Award. Congratulations Ms. Lequieu!

In this paper, Lequieu suggests residents of Iron County, WI, where a large iron-mining project was proposed, both drew on and reconstructed their community's resource extractive past when making sense of the proposed project. Drawing from 60 interviews, Lequieu found that residents expressed a shared sense of home, and cast the project not in simplistic terms of 'economic development,' but as a means to reaffirm the permanency of their place, their home. As Lequieu explains, "jobs, via a new mine, might stem the withering and enable residents to maintain, revitalize, and deepen their commitment to their home" (p. 25).

Congratulations to you on your superb analysis!



#### NRRIG Graduate Student Travel Award

We were also pleased to present **Elly Engle** and **Colleen Unroe**, of the Pennsylvania State University, with Graduate Student Travel Awards. Congrats to you both!

Engle presented an engaging paper entitled, "A rural food-energy-water nexus: environmental justice implications of community-based programs in Central Appalachia." Engle's paper discusses the ways in which the socio-economic context of energy resource dependency and its short- and long-term consequences for environmental and human health have impacted the processes and outcomes of household and communitybased gardening programs across Central Appalachian communities.



Unroe had a productive conference, presenting three papers: "Conditions and Constraints Related to Collaborative Management of Natural Resources in Pennsylvania," from her master's thesis on collaborative governance and stakeholder diversity; "The Effects of Intersectional Feminist Praxis on Environmental Justice Organizing in Central Appalachia," from her work on environmental justice campaigns surrounding mountaintop removal coal mining and valley fills; and "The Road Will Turn: People's Stories of Job Loss Transition in Rural SW PA," from her work on adaptive strategies used by workers to navigate the disruptive impacts of economic decline in the coal and steel industry.

We are proud to support the participation of these emerging scholars in our annual meeting.

# **Award Guidelines**

Deadlines for paper and travel award submissions and nominations for the William R. Freudenburg Award have changed. The previous year's award winners are asked to serve, alongside our RIG's chairs, as reviewers for the following year's submissions. Award winners are expected to attend the annual meeting as well as the NRRIG business meeting. Paper award winners are also expected to present their winning paper at the annual meeting.

# NRRIG William R. Freudenburg Award of Merit

The William R. Freudenburg Award of Merit is presented to recognize exceptional contributions to the sociology of natural resources and the environment. The award is given to recognize an outstanding legacy / collective body of work that has demonstrably impacted natural resources and environmental sociology.

Recipients will have the following qualifications: outstanding research and scholarship as evidenced not solely by numbers of publications, but their impact: simply put, we are looking for recipients who *have substantively affected the trajectory of thinking within* 

*natural resources and environmental sociology.* Such impact may also be evidenced via application of work beyond the academy, such as work with a natural resources agency, organization, or other partnerships. Other contributions to the NRRIG or sociology of natural resources and environment, such as an outstanding legacy of outreach, graduate student mentorship, and/or instruction are also envisioned as important criteria for consideration. Nominees are not required to be present or past members of the NRRIG.

To nominate someone please submit 1) up to three letters of nomination that clearly explain the reasons for considering the nomination and the nominee's contribution to the sociology of natural resources and environment, as well as 2) a current copy of the nominee's CV. Additional supporting materials may be sent, but are not required. Nomination materials must be submitted to the NRRIG chair by **May 4** of the year of application. The winner will be selected by a committee of NRRIG members and notified by **July 1** of the year of application.

# NRRIG Graduate Student Travel Scholarship

The NRRIG Graduate Student Travel Scholarship is intended to support graduate student participation at the RSS annual meetings.

The recipient will be reimbursed for the student (member) registration cost for the RSS annual meeting (\$125).

There is a two-step process for submission: 1) Submit an abstract to present an oral presentation in the area of environmental or natural resources sociology at the annual meeting; 2) submit a cover letter to the NRRG chair by **May 4** of the year of application. Cover letters will be reviewed based on need (i.e., does the student have alternative funding sources via his/her department or advisor), and importance of the meeting to the student's career trajectory. Abstracts will be evaluated based on relevance, innovation, and/or potential contribution to the NRRIG. The winner will be selected by a committee of NRRIG members and notified by **July 1** of the year of application.

# NRRIG Graduate Student Paper Award

The Natural Resources Research Interest Group (NRRIG) of the Rural Sociological Society is soliciting submissions for a graduate student paper award in the area environmental or natural resources sociology. The paper should be related to the broad interests of the NRRIG. Current graduate students and recent graduates (who receive their degrees no earlier than May of the year of award) may apply.

Coauthored papers are acceptable, including those co-authored with faculty. If co-authored, the applicant (a) must be the lead author of the manuscript, and (b) provide a statement detailing the relative contributions of each co-author.

The recipient will receive a monetary prize of at least \$100 (final amount TBD based on NRRIG budget) to defray the cost of attending the Annual Meetings of RSS. The recipient will also be recognized at the NRRIG business meeting.

There is a two-step process for submission: 1) Submit an abstract to present the paper at the 2016 meeting; 2) Send an electronic copy of the full paper with contact information to

the NRRIG chair by **May 4** of the year of application; and (3) if co-authored, provide a statement detailing the relative contributions of each co-author.

The paper submission should not exceed 35 double-spaced pages (including all tables, graphs, and references) in a standard font (12 point). The winner will be selected by a committee of NRRIG members and notified by **July 1** of the year of application.

Papers will be evaluated using the following criteria:

- 1. Advancement of knowledge in the area environmental or natural resources sociology.
- 2. Significance of the topic for the NRRG of the Rural Sociological Society.
- 3. Quality and implementation of the research, theory, and argument.
- 4. Analysis and interpretation of the findings.
- 5. Clarity and organization of the writing.

Over 300 scholars, activists, and environmental professionals attended DOPE 2017, representing dozens of disciplines and more than 90 academic institutions spread across four continents.

The conference is open to any topical, theoretical, or methodological framework that brings together scholarship on the ecological dimensions of political, social, and economic research, as well as the social aspects of natural sciences.

# Call for Organized Sessions

The DOPE Organizers *strongly encourage* participants to organize their own sessions, or to join sessions organized by other participants, rather than submit individual 'orphan' papers. To organize your own session, please:

1. Draft a Call for Papers (CFP). For an idea of the themes and structure of past DOPE Conference sessions, we suggest consulting the <u>program from last year's conference</u>.

2. Email your CFP to the DOPE Organizers at <u>ukpewg@gmail.com</u>. We will post it to our social media and website. You should also distribute it among your colleagues and to relevant listservs.

3. Conference registration will open on October 1, 2017. All participants in your session must have registered and paid by the final registration deadline **(December 1, 2017)**. As such, we suggest that you establish a session deadline of **November 17** or earlier.

4. After you have submitted your call, we will send you a Google Form that you will have to complete. This will confirm the final composition of your panel, including participants' names, institutions, abstracts (300 word limit), titles, keywords, discussants, organizers, chairs, and other relevant information. We will ask that you be as detailed as possible and send this information by the final registration deadline (**December 1, 2017**).

# *Guidelines and Suggestions for Session Organizers*

- When planning, remember that each session is 100 minutes long, and we strictly limit organizers to two session slots.
- While we welcome conventional paper sessions, we also encourage organizers to consider workshops, panel discussions, lightning talks, or other session styles.
- Each DOPE participant may present in one session and also serve as a discussant or panelist in ONE additional session. We ask that participants limit themselves to two conference activities.
- Undergraduate students are asked to submit their papers to our Annual Undergraduate Symposium.

# Individual Abstracts

We strongly encourage participants to submit abstracts in response to CFPs being circulated (follow listservs and check our <u>website</u> for new CFPs); however, we will accept individual abstracts. Abstracts submitted to the conference individually rather than in response to specific CFPs will be sorted thematically, and **cannot be guaranteed** placement in the conference schedule.

Abstracts should be no more than 300 words in length and include a title and three to five keywords. Abstracts should be submitted within the registration form. The abstract submission deadline is **December 1, 2017.** 

# Registration

Registration will be linked from our <u>website</u> **starting October 1, 2017, and ending December 1, 2017.** The conference registration fee is \$45 for graduate students and \$90 for faculty and non-academics. There is no fee for undergraduate participants. All University of Kentucky students register for free.

# Special Issue of *Sustainability*: "Community, Natural Resources, and Sustainability: An Interdisciplinary and International Dialogue."

Natural resource-based communities (communities with intimate ties to natural resources) are uniquely situated in the intersection of human society and the environment. Community related theories and approaches have been increasingly employed by researchers from a range of disciplines to study natural resource use and management in both developing and developed country settings. Due to the diverse perspectives and interests involved in the study of community and natural resources, there are considerable variations in the conception of the core concept community, research methods, and empirical findings, while synthesis across disciplinary lineages and development contexts is largely limited. As a concrete dimension of sustainability and sustainable development, community sustainability provides an overarching framework to bridging and integrating research on the multifaceted community-resources nexus. This Special Issue seeks to engage an interdisciplinary and international dialogue on the interrelationships of society, natural resources, and sustainability at the community level. We invite theoretical, empirical, and methodological research articles as well as practice-based papers that address a variety of relevant topics including but not limited to: (1) the relationships between natural resource dependency and community sustainability (or more specific aspects such as community vulnerability/adaptation, community capitals, and community resilience); (2) community approaches to common-pool or public natural resource management (e.g., community-based natural resource management or community involvement in resource management); (3) the impacts of demographic change (e.g., labor out-migration and amenity migration) on community and natural resources; (4) community responses to natural resource-related shocks/stressors (e.g., floods, wildfires, and forest insect disturbances) or resource-based growth (e.g., energy or tourism development); and (5) community contextual effects on individual natural resource-related attitudes and behavior. Studies using an interdisciplinary or transdisciplinary approach, collaborative and comparative field-based research, and creative systematic reviews and meta-analyses are particularly encouraged.
